New York State Missing Persons Clearinghouse 2024 Annual Report

The New York State Missing Persons Clearinghouse is located within the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS).

The Clearinghouse operates in accordance with New York State Executive Law Sections 837, 837-e, 837-f, 837-f-1 and 838; New York State Codes, Rules and Regulations Part 6055; and New York State Education Law Sections 355, 6206, 6303 and 6450.

This report is submitted as required by Section 837-f-12 of the New York State Executive Law.

On the Cover

Fifth grader Hailey Morey created the winning image for the annual New York State Missing Children's Poster Contest, which is organized and coordinated by the Missing Persons Clearinghouse.

New York and other states coordinate their own contests, and the state winners compete against each other in the national contest, helping to raise awareness about missing children's cases across the country. The Missing Persons Clearinghouse coordinates New York's competition. National Missing Children's Day has been observed on May 25 since 1983.

Hailey Morey, who attends Gillette Road Middle School in Cicero, depicted strong arms hugging a teddy bear and waiting for a missing child to return home. Morey explained that she used the American sign language symbol for the word 'hug' and drew a map in the background to illustrate that we're all connected by our goal of helping children. Hailey's drawing was entered into the National Missing Children's Day Poster Contest, an annual competition sponsored by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ).

The New York State contest judges also selected second- and third-place winners for the state competition: Gerard Bonilla, who attends Our Lady of Victory School in Mt. Vernon and Sofia Alexandra Acebo who attends Riverhead Charter School in Riverhead, on Long Island.

Data Overview

Missing Children

- The number of children reported missing in New York State decreased 3.9 percent in 2024, for a total of 12,114. The change was the result of an increase in cases reported by law enforcement in New York City (+6.3%) and a decrease in cases reported by law enforcement outside New York City (-9.1%).
- All New York State counties except Hamilton, Schoharie, and Yates counties reported at least one missing child.
- 33 counties outside of New York City reported decreases in the number of new cases, while 24 other counties outside of New York City reported the same volume or higher.
- The statewide missing child rate was 2.95 missing children's cases per 1,000 children in 2024. Albany and Oneida counties had the highest rates of cases reported in the state: 18.5 per 1,000 children and 8 per 1,000 children, respectively.
- 91.2 percent of children reported missing were 13 years old or older, 59.6 percent were female, and 55.8 percent were non-white. The largest single group of missing children's cases involved Black females, ages 13 15 (17.9% of all cases reported).
- The number of children reported as runaways (11,492) accounted for 94.9 percent of disappearances among children under 18 years old.
- There was one stranger abduction(s) reported in 2024, the same number that was reported in 2023.
- There was one acquaintance abduction reported in 2024, compared to eight reported in 2023.
- There were 24 familial abduction cases in 2024, 15 less than in 2023, and 15 reports of children abducted by a non-custodial parent in 2024, compared to 32 in 2023.
- The largest number of missing children's cases (1,182) were reported in October, and the fewest (768) were reported in December.
- A total of 12,310 cases involving missing children from 2024 and prior years were closed in 2024.
- In 60 percent of cases closed during 2024, the child voluntarily returned home.
- Law enforcement assisted with the return of children in 38.8 percent of cases, and a total
 of nine children who had been reported missing in Erie, Monroe, Nassau, New York City,
 Onondaga, Schenectady Counties were found deceased.
- The median number of days between the reporting and cancellation of a case on the Register was three days, the same as in 2023.
- 1,067 cases remained active at the end of the year.

Missing Adults / Vulnerable Adults

- A total of 6,011 adults were reported missing in New York State in 2024; 1,707 (28.3%) were reported as vulnerable adults. The number of missing vulnerable adults decreased 2.2 percent when compared to 2023 (1,747).
- Excluding New York City, Suffolk County had the highest number of missing adult cases reported (511) followed by Monroe County (480), Erie County (434), Nassau County (393) and Westchester County (345).
- The majority of missing vulnerable adults (65.6%) were reported outside of New York City.
 A total of 1,157 cases were reported in the 57 counties outside of New York City, compared to 544 in New York City.
- Excluding New York City, Nassau County had the highest number of missing vulnerable adult cases reported (217) followed by Westchester County (142), Erie County (90), Monroe County (62) and Suffolk County (56).
- More vulnerable adults between the ages of 70 and 79 were reported missing than any other age category (19.7% or 336 of 1,707).
- Men accounted for 61.7 percent of missing vulnerable adults, and 53.7 percent of missing vulnerable adults were white.
- The largest number of missing adult cases (578) were reported in July, and the fewest (426) were reported in December.
- A total of 7,807 missing adult cases from 2024 and prior years were closed during 2024, 1,711 of which were missing vulnerable adult cases.
- The median number of days between a missing vulnerable adult report and closure, in 2024, was two.
- 1,607 adult cases remained active at the end of the year, including 186 missing vulnerable adult cases.

Clearinghouse Services

The Clearinghouse maintains a statewide electronic central registry of missing persons that is compatible with the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) registry for missing persons. Clearinghouse staff also provide investigative support and training to law enforcement, as well as assistance to left-behind family members.

In addition to their work to support law enforcement agencies in New York State, Clearinghouse staff members assist law enforcement agencies and clearinghouses in other states, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC), not-for-profit organizations and the U.S. Department of State.

The Clearinghouse administers three alert programs that quickly disseminate information to law enforcement, the public and other entities when children under the age of 21, college students, or vulnerable adults with cognitive impairments, are reported missing and are at a credible risk of harm.

Investigative Support

- As required by law, Clearinghouse staff flag birth and educational records of missing children, which results in a notification to school and vital records administrators that a child from their school was reported missing. If someone then requests a flagged school or birth record, that information is transmitted to the Clearinghouse and can provide a lead to the missing child's location.
- The Clearinghouse notifies the appropriate law enforcement agency whenever it receives leads about a missing person's case. Staff also develop leads by conducting searches through informational databases and social networking sites.
- The Clearinghouse assists with entering missing and unidentified person information into state
 and federal databases used for law enforcement investigations. This includes assisting law
 enforcement agencies and medical examiners with coding and entering dental records and
 other anatomical information on missing persons.
- Clearinghouse staff prepare and distribute posters of missing children, missing college students and missing vulnerable adults to the public and private sector through the state's NY-ALERT system and through the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children's Lost Child Alert Technology Resource (LOCATER).
 - These tools are utilized by the Clearinghouse to allow for rapid electronic dissemination of photographs, biographical information, and case details. Information can be sent electronically to every law enforcement agency, New York State Thruway service areas, as well as bus, train and airport terminals. A public subscription service is used to notify individuals across the state about these cases within minutes.
- The Clearinghouse publicizes missing child, college student and vulnerable adult photographs and biographical information on the DCJS and NCMEC websites, provided that a family member or guardian grants permission. NCMEC only publicizes missing children's cases.
- Clearinghouse staff provide case management advice to investigating law enforcement agencies, including assessment of case details and assistance with obtaining urgent services.
- The Clearinghouse collaborates with NCMEC and other state clearinghouses, participating in a network that can directly provide nationwide and international assistance to law enforcement agencies and family members.
- The Clearinghouse assists the U.S. Department of State to locate and return internationally abducted children to their country of origin, in accordance with the Hague Treaty on the Civil Aspects of International Abduction.
- Clearinghouse staff develop and distribute investigative guides and presentation material.
 Publications and training videos are available to law enforcement officers via a secure, online portal and through training programs for law enforcement officers.

- The Missing Persons Clearinghouse manages a Missing Person Cold Case Review Panel to provide law enforcement agencies with a fresh look at cases that have gone cold. The panel features subject-matter experts with diverse perspectives, knowledge and experience from local, state and federal law enforcement and criminal justice agencies. The Cold Case Review Panel only accepts cases submitted by lead investigating agencies. There is no cost for the review.
- The Clearinghouse has partnered with Project Lifesaver International to provide law enforcement agencies across the state with tracking technology to help locate individuals with cognitive disorders when they go missing. The state has provided transmitters and accompanying technology at no cost to agencies for use on children and adults who may have an impairment that can cause them to wander from a safe environment. Worn on the wrist or ankle, the transmitter emits an individualized frequency signal that allows first responders to locate the position of an individual. Most individuals who wander are found within a few miles from home, and Project Lifesaver technology can reduce search time from hours or days to minutes. View the list of participating law enforcement agencies. Parents and caregivers may contact the agency in their county to learn whether their family member is eligible for a free transmitter.
- Clearinghouse coordinates the NYS Runaway Intervention Working Group. The working
 group is a collaborative effort made up of representatives from 23 national, state, and local
 agencies and organizations. The mission of the group is to develop a systems approach that
 is preventative in nature that addresses the needs of missing youth who have multiple
 episodes of running away.
- The Clearinghouse also spearheaded a first-of-its-kind Missing Child Rescue Operation in the state, which resulted in the location of 47 children who were reported missing in Erie County. The cases, which involved children who had been reported missing to the Amherst and Buffalo police departments, were solved through this unique collaboration among the Missing Persons Clearinghouse at DCJS, the National Child Protection Task Force, the New York State Office of Children and Family Services, the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children, and law enforcement professionals and private sector partners who convened in late September to review cases at the Scott Bieler Child Advocacy Center at BestHelp in Buffalo. The recent operation brought together law enforcement professionals from Erie County and beyond, as well as representatives from nonprofit organizations and privatesector business to take a fresh look at the cases, which involved children who had run away or had been taken by their non-custodial parents. The teams explored new leads, reviewed case notes and leveraged technology to assist with the investigations. A total of 56 experts were divided among teams with an initial goal to review 25 cases. Their efforts proved so successful that another 25 cases were presented for review. In all, 40 children were located during the operation and seven more children, whose cases were examined during the joint exercise, were found after the operation concluded late last month. The three other cases remain under investigation by the Buffalo Police Department.

Overview Alert Programs

Alert Programs

New York State utilizes four alert programs, and the Clearinghouse administers these programs, with the exception of Amber Alerts.

Alerts are designed to ensure the most rapid and widespread dissemination of information about missing children under the age of 21, missing college students of any age, and missing vulnerable adults with Alzheimer's disease, dementia or other cognitive impairment.

Alerts are issued at the request of law enforcement when certain criteria are met.



AMBER Alerts are activated for abducted children younger than 18 who are believed to be at risk for serious bodily harm or death. They are administered by the New York State Police. For more information: www.amber.ny.gov.



Missing Child Alerts are activated when a child younger than 21 is missing and believed to be in danger due to special circumstances, such as young age of the child, a cognitive impairment, medical condition, or other situation, that place them at serious risk of harm or death.



Missing College Student Alerts are activated when a college student of any age is missing and is deemed to be at credible risk of harm or death.



Missing Vulnerable Adult Alerts are activated when an individual, who is 18 or older and has a cognitive disorder, brain injury or mental disability, is reported missing and is at credible risk of harm. This includes individuals with autism, dementia, or Alzheimer's disease.

Within minutes of an alert activation, information about the person is distributed to police agencies, the media, New York State Thruway Authority signs and plazas, New York State Department of Transportation highway signs, airports, bus terminals, train stations, hospitals and other locations. Details are displayed on highway signs for up to eight hours.

Alerts can remain active for up to 72 hours. If the individual remains missing after three days, case details are posted to www.criminaljustice.ny.gov/missing.

Alert Activations

The Clearinghouse administers three alert programs, which are activated at the request of police agencies when a child, college student or vulnerable adult goes missing and certain criteria are met.

Clearinghouse staff activated 191 alerts: 37 missing child alerts were activated, two college student alerts, and 152 alerts for vulnerable adults. Of the 37 children who were the subjects of a missing child alert, all 37 were found safe and returned home. Of the two college student alerts, both were found safe and returned home. Of the 152 vulnerable adults who were the subjects of an alert, 148 were found safe and returned home, three were located deceased and one is unresolved.

A summary financial plan and projections of these funds is as follows:




Annual Reporting Volume for Missing Children: 2015–2024

2024 Characteristics of Cases Entered for Missing Children












2024 Cases Opened for Adults with Multiple Historical Incidents vs. Cases Opened
