ACTION/APPROVAL ITEMS

#1 - Introductory Remarks - Adoption of Agenda- Approval of 265th Meeting Minutes

The 266th session of the Municipal Police Training Council (MPTC or Council) commenced at 10:03 a.m. with Commissioner Rosado leading all attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance and followed by a moment of silence in remembrance for all law enforcement and those who lost their lives serving this country.

Introductions

Commissioner Rosado introduced herself as the interim chair and introductions were made by all in attendance both in-person and remotely. Council members Sheriff Toulon and Debra Long joined the meeting remotely.

Introductory Remarks

Commissioner Rosado provided an update on the Governor's budget enacted in April 2024. The Commissioner informed the Council the budget includes more than 127 million dollars in law enforcement technology and equipment to 378 law enforcement agencies outside of New York City, more than 35 million dollars to enhance police and prosecution efforts to combat domestic violence, and 15 million dollars to organize retail theft through crime analysis and information sharing with the DA's offices and police departments. The budget also assists the state's gun violence prevention efforts through the GIVE initiative, the Crime Analysis Center Network, Snug Street Outreach, and Project Rise. These programs have contributed to driving down shootings by more than 35% this year compared to the 5-year average. The Commissioner closed by assuring council members the work to promote trust and confidence in the justice system will continue.

Adoption of Agenda

Dr. McBride made a motion to adopt the 266th meeting agenda, with a second by **Maureen Curtis**; the motion was passed by unanimous vote. Commissioner Rosado proceeded with the approval of 265th meeting minutes.

Approval of 265th Meeting Minutes

Dr. McBride made a motion to approve the 265th meeting minutes as submitted with a second by **Carla DiRienzo**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

#2- Basic Course for Police Officers Updates

Michael Puckett of the Office of Public Safety provided the Council with updates on the Basic Course for Police Officers. He explained there are three motions that needed to be presented individually.

The first motion is regarding updates to Penal Law – Part 3, Section A. Due to laws being repealed and changed, certain amendments were removed or added to the Penal Law Section. He explained the "Rape is Rape Act" redefined rape to include conduct that is currently categorized under other crimes. As a result, the Penal Law section was updated where rape and criminal sex act charges were discussed to be consistent with recent law changes. The section was also updated to reflect new sections of assault on a retail worker (Penal Law §120.19) and fostering the sale of stolen goods (Penal Law §165.66). Mr. Puckett mentioned the 2025 FY budget bill (L. 2024, Ch. 55) included these new crimes related to retail theft.

Executive Deputy Commissioner Popcun asked if these updates were mostly reference changes in the Penal Law section. Michael Puckett informed him they were and added that the Penal Law section is unique in the way that the learning objectives are laid out; otherwise, this wouldn't have been brought to the Council due to the minor modifications.

Dr. McBride asked if changes to the Penal Law were related to the rise of organized retail theft. Michael Puckett affirmed they were part of the budget bill in response to organized theft.

The second motion Mr. Puckett covered is for changes to Narcotics and Dangerous Drug – Part 7, Section A. Certain terminology has been changed due to recent law changes. He provided an example by explaining the term marijuana was changed to cannabis in the learning objectives. Also, references to the medical cannabis card have been removed; according to the Office of Cannabis Management, the card is no longer being utilized.

The third motion covered consists of updating Basic Crash Management and Reporting – Part 7, Section F. The Council was informed that the Department of Motor Vehicles is launching a new police accident report form. Form MV-104A will be replaced with Form MV-104P. The appendix will be updated to include this new form and Form P-33, which provides guidance to officers on completing the MV-104P.

Motion #1: Approve updates to Penal Law Offenses – Part 3, Section A as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, the Basic Course for Peace Officers, the Campus Public Safety Officer Course, and the Specialized Investigator Course. All employers and academies conducting these courses, beginning on or after September 1, 2024, must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

Dr. McBride made a motion to approve with a second by **Carla DiRienzo**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

Motion #2: Approve updates to Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs – Part 7, Section I as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent, the Campus Public Safety Officer Course, and the Specialized Investigator Course. All employers and academies conducting these courses, beginning on or after September 1, 2024, must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

Dr. McBride made a motion to approve with a second by **Carla DiRienzo.** The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

Motion #3: Approve updates to Basic Crash Management and Reporting – Part 7, Section F as the minimum standard of instruction in the Basic Course for Police Officers or equivalent and the Campus Public Safety Officer Course. All employers and academies conducting these courses, beginning on or after September 1, 2024, must utilize the newly approved curriculum.

Dr. McBride made a motion to approve with a second by **Carla DiRienzo**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

#3- Sexual Offense Evidence Kit Model Policy Update

Joshua Vinehout of the Office of Public Safety provided the Council with an update on the Sexual Offense Evidence Kit Model Policy. Before he spoke about the update, he gave a summary on the development and timeline of the model policy. He reminded the Council of

their request in June of 2015 for the Office of Public Safety (OPS) to examine sexual offense evidence kits best practices. There was a concern regarding the backlog of kits being processed, so OPS developed a model policy. In December of that year, the Sexual Offense Evidence Kits model policy was presented to the Council and adopted. Two years later, a change in the law required law enforcement to submit kits to the lab within 10 days, and any drug facilitated kit is to be submitted within 72 hours, or as soon as practicable.

He continued by mentioning another update to the model policy made in June of 2019. The update included the addition of the sexual assault victim Bill of Rights, which is required to be provided to a sexual assault victim. He also reminded the Council there was a new training requirement put in place in 2019 under executive law. It required each police agency and prosecutorial agency to have at least one individual trained in trauma informed victim response, specifically for handling sexual assault cases. DCJS was responsible to establish the minimum training standards which were endorsed by the Council.

Before providing an overview of the current proposed amendments, Mr. Vinehout concluded with a summary of one additional change made previously in 2019. He reviewed the necessary information that must be provided to the victim regarding DNA hits and the requirement to provide the victim with contact information of the trained law enforcement officer.

After concluding his review, he proposed updates to the model policy based on NYS Office of Victim Services (OVS) being the designated agency to store untested kits. The update includes language to reflect the process for OVS to release stored untested kits to law enforcement if the victim chooses to initiate an investigation. Mr. Vinehout pointed out to the Council where in the model policy the update was made.

Mr. Vinehout concluded by informing the Council that DCJS will send a memo out to law enforcement agencies advising them of the updated model policy if the amendments are approved.

Maureen Curtis asked if there was an advocate that explains the ramifications concerning the disposal of evidence to the survivor/victim. Mr. Vinehout explained to Maureen that the Office of Victim Services (OVS) was probably the office that was better suited to answer that question. Director Johanna Sullivan assured Maureen that she would reach out to OVS and let her know what they said.

Motion- Adopt the amendments made to the MPTC Sexual Offense Evidence Kit Model Policy.

Dr. McBride made a motion to amend with a second by **Carla DiRienzo**. The motion was passed by unanimous vote.

INFORMATIONAL/UPDATE ITEMS

#1- Regulations - Updates

Natasha Harvin-Locklear, Office of Legal Services, updated the Council on the status of the regulatory amendments to the in-person death notification training for new and current police officers. She informed the Council that the Governor approved the amendments which became effective on April 3, 2024.

#2- TraCS Academy Training and Equipment for Law Enforcement Academies

Michael Puckett of the Office of Public Safety informed the Council of a plan to utilize a NYSP unit that supports TraCS. The unit will work with academies that are prepared to use TraCS by providing access to the program in a training environment. Funding to support the academies for the purchase of laptops necessary to run the program is being made available through a Governor's Traffic Safety grant. That laptops will be purchased through reoccurring grant funding lasting long enough to equip each police recruit and every police academy.

Dr. McBride asked what we would we do with the MPTC academies that weren't tech savvy. Michael Puckett explained that it depended on a few factors, such as their IT's ability and desire to cooperate. The academies that are ready and support this would probably be prioritized over the academies that are hesitant or need another budget.

#3- Basic Course for Correction Officers Job Task Analysis

Molly Bates of the Office of Public Safety provided the Council with an update on the Basic Course for Correction Officers. She informed the Council that her unit will be redesigning the Basic Course for Correction Officers to ensure it meets the needs of new officers and employing agencies. To best determine the core job tasks of a corrections officer, OPS will be conducting a job task analysis (JTA). The JTA will provide an analysis of the core tasks and competencies of an officer as well as related instructional objectives. A potential vendor with corrections experience has been identified.

Molly continued by informing the Council an advisory panel of correction professionals will be assembled to assist with the JTA survey development and training materials. The panel members will be selected based on facility size and geographic region to ensure they have appropriate representation. They will also be seeking representatives from New York City DOCCS and State Commission of Corrections. The goal is to begin the JTA in September and have survey results at the end of the year or the beginning of 2025.

Lastly, Molly introduced a new staff member of OPS, Gavin Boyer. She acknowledged how Mr. Boyer has been instrumental in the research and selection of the JTA vendor and communicating the redevelopment process with the corrections community.

Executive Deputy Commissioner Popcun asked when the Basic Course for Correction Officers was last updated. Molly Bates explained that it hasn't received a comprehensive update since 2008 due to the availability of staff resources.

New Business

There was no new business raised by the Council but there were a few questions asked.

Dr. McBride asked if there was any update regarding the MPTC physical ability standard discussed during the March meeting. Mr. Vinehout replied that he was currently waiting to receive the consultant's proposal for phase two of the project. Once he received it, he will be working with Legal and Funding to have the contract in place. Mr. Vinehout mentioned he is hoping the second phase will begin by the end of the year.

Dr. McBride then asked for an update regarding the BCPO Firearms curriculum, which was also discussed during the previous meeting. He inquired about the extensions that were made for some zones and the requirement for Zones 1 through 3 to use only instructors that have completed the refresher training. Michael Puckett confirmed that all academies have the requirement to begin utilizing the new curriculum, and the three zones required to use only approved firearms instructors will be able to meet the September 1st requirement. OPS will continue to offer Firearm Instructor Workshops, especially in underserved areas geographically in the state. In addition, pilots of the new Firearm Instructor are scheduled.

Lastly, Commissioner Rosado reminded the Council that there will be an appreciation luncheon on September 12th, 2024, for the members of MPTC and LEAAC. Besides showing appreciation, this will be an opportunity for everyone to meet each other.

The 266th session of the Municipal Police Training Council came to a close at 10:40 a.m. with a motion to adjourn by **Dr. McBride** and a second by **Carla DiRienzo**. The motion was unanimously approved.

Firearms Instructor Workshop

The Office of Public Safety will present the Firearms Instructor Workshop to the Council for their review and approval.

The Firearms Instructor Workshop serves as an instructor update course to prepare current MPTC Firearms Instructors to teach the new BCPO Firearms course. This five-day course consists of updated instruction on shooting and coaching trainees. The instruction follows the following schedule:

Motion 1:

Informational Item #4

Legislative Updates

The Office of Public Safety staff will update the Council on several legislative bills that will impact the responsibilities of the Council if signed by the Governor.

NYS Senate Bill 8881: Directs DCJS, in cooperation with OVS, to develop and implement a standardized procedure for law enforcement to notify family members and dependents who may be eligible for crime victim compensation awards about the existence of such awards and any other relevant services or programs. Requires that the MPTC model law enforcement death notification policy include procedures for providing information to the deceased individual's next of kin regarding the existence of available programs and support services.

NYS Senate Bill 2747: Directs the MPTC, in consultation with OCFS, to develop written policies and procedures regarding child-sensitive arrest practices.

NYS Senate Bill 6162: An act to amend Municipal Police Training Council's color vision requirements for appointment of police officers.

NYS Assembly Bill 7717: Amends CPLR to allow a law enforcement agency to be name as the ERPO petitioner. Would require an update to the MPTC ERPO model policy.
